WENATCHEE - An East Wenatchee man and a Cashmere woman were charged Wednesday with burglarizing a Lake Wenatcheearea factory using a stolen truck.

Cameron Michael Darnell, 23, was arrested early Saturday at U.S. Mat Systems, off Highway 2 near Winton.

Chelan County sheriff's deputies said Darnell and Heather Marie Smith, 34, entered the plant about 12:30 a.m. in an attempt to steal April.

Cashmere. The project is expected to be completed in time for a Sept. 11, 2015, dedication.

The Spirit of America Committee has raised about \$16,500 so far for the anchoring project estimated to cost about \$120,000. Green said most of that expense be absorbed by pledged donations of labor and materials from local contractors, builders, architects, lumber yards, concrete finishers, metal forgers and welders. Designer Robert Miller drew up the plans for the project, another donation.

"When you see how much help, money and effort has been contributed, you see how civic-minded and patriotic the people of Cashmere are," said Cashmere Mayor Jeff Gomes. "Cashmere is the spirit of

America."

The group lobbied to win the bronze sculpture of clasphanded figures representing those lost in the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Sculpted by Jim and Christina Demetro and funded by a Lacey non-profit group, the life-size structure had traveled through the state on a flatbed trailer looking for a home. Some western Washington cities didn't want it. Cashmere won out over many that did.

"I never dreamed it would come here," said Jack Purcel, a Navy veteran of the Vietnam War and member of the Cashmere committee. "I thought for sure some bigger city or an airport would get it.'

The project is scheduled for completion in time for dedication Sept. 11, 2015. Donations to complete the project and maintain it can be made to the Community Foundation of North Central Washington, 9 S. Wenatchee Ave., Wenatchee, WA 98801.
